BACKGROUND

United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) launched a five-year national project (2018-2023), the Livelihoods Improvement of Urban Poor Communities Project (LIUPCP), to reduce urban poverty. The project is being implemented in collaboration with by the Local Government Division (LGD) and funded by the UK's Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO).

The LIUPCP aims to support balanced, sustainable, and pro-poor urban development in Bangladesh. The project will contribute to more effective and inclusive urbanization by working across three different levels of intervention: the community level; municipal level and national level. The project is being implemented in 19 Cities/Towns (11 City Corporations and 8 Municipalities) across the Country with a focus on reaching out to the most marginalized populations amongst the urban poor.

To strengthen the evidence base and to measure the results, the LIUPCP in partnership with the Consortium Partners - Human Development Research Centre (HDRC) and the International Institute of Social Studies (ISS), The Netherlands – is carrying out a Quasi-Experimental Impact Evaluation. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, LIUPCP carried out a Socio-Economic Assessment (SEA) to understand the short term, medium-term and long-term impact of COVID -19 on the urban poor communities in LIUPCP areas across 19 Cities/Towns. This Knowledge Sharing Platform aims to promote cross learning through –

- 1. Sharing Innovative approaches in equity-focused and gender-responsive Evaluation Methodologies
- 2. Using the findings of the Impact Evaluation and Socio-Economic Study for policy dialogue on urban poor

ANNEX: BIOGRAPHY

M. A. Mannan MP, Honorable Minister, Ministry of Planning, Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh

Muhammad Abdul Mannan, MP joined the former Civil Service of Pakistan (CSP) cadre in 1974 and served in the Government of Bangladesh in various positions, including as Deputy Commissioner of Kishorgonj, Mymensing and Chittagong Districts. He worked as Joint Secretary (Political) in the Ministry of Home A"airs, Director General in the Prime Minister's office and Director General of NGO A"airs Bureau. He also served in the Bangladesh Permanent Mission in Geneva as Economic Minister. He retired from Government service in 2003 as Chairman of Bangladesh Small & Cottage Industries Corporation (BSCIC). He joined Bangladesh Awami League in 2005 and returned as a Member of Parliament (MP) on the Bangladesh Awami League ticket in 2008. In the 9th Parliament, he served as Chairman of the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Accounts. He also served as a member of the Parliamentary Standing Committee of Ministry of Public Administration, Ministry of Finance and Ministry of Defense. In the latter position, he represented the Honorable Prime Minister. Having returned a second time as Member of Parliament in 2014, he was appointed in the new Cabinet of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina as State Minister of Finance on 12th January 2014. In April same year, he was given the concurrent responsibility of State Minister the Ministry of Planning. After the Eleventh Parliament election, he was appointed Minister of Planning on 7th January 2019.

Sudipto Mukerjee, Resident Representative, UNDP Bangladesh

Sudipto Mukerjee is an Architect & Town Planner with more than two decades of experience in international development. Sudipto has previously worked with the Government of India (1992-1997), UK Department for International Development (1998-March 2005 as Infrastructure and Urban Advisor) and UN-Habitat (2005-2009, Head of Country Office). He joined UNDP in September 2009 in the Iraq Country Office and has since worked as Country Director in Sierra Leone (August 2013-October 2016) & UNDP Bangladesh (October 2016-November 2018). He assumed the responsibility of the Resident Representative, UNDP Bangladesh from December 2018. Sudipto comes with diverse crisis management experience having worked in Iraq (Conflict), Sierra Leone (Ebola Pandemic) and Bangladesh (Rohingya Refugee). Sudipto is also affiliated with the UN Sta" System College as an Expert on Strategic Planning.

Anir Chowdhury, Policy Advisor, Aspire to Innovate (a2i), UNDP Bangladesh

Anir Chowdhury is the Policy Advisor of the a2i Programmme of the ICT Division and the Cabinet Division of the Government of Bangladesh supported by the UNDP. In this capacity, he leads the formation of a whole-of-society innovation ecosystem in Bangladesh through massive technology deployment, extensive capacity development, integrated policy formulation, whole-of-government institutional reform, and an Innovation Fund. His work on innovation in public service has developed interesting and replicable models of service delivery decentralization, public-private partnerships, and transformation of a traditional bureaucracy into a forward-looking, citizen-centric service provider. He is a member of the Prime Minister's National Digital Task Force, Education Minister's National ICT in Education Task Force, UNESCAP Regional Steering Group for Civil Registration and Vital Statistics (CRVS), Co-Founder and Board Member of South-South Network for Public Service Innovation (SSN4PSI) and Co-Founder of South-Asia Civil Registration Network (CR8).

Ashekur Rahman, Assistant Resident Representative, UNDP Bangladesh

Ashekur Rahman is the Assistant Resident Representative (ARR) of UNDP Bangladesh. Currently, he heads UNDP's democratic and economic governance portfolios and brings rich years of experience in the development sector, both at the national and international domain, of which a decade he served within the UN system particularly in the areas of urban governance, social security policies, poverty reduction, and institutional reforms. Before joining UNDP, he worked for CARE International in Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and Madagascar.
